



Warning against early release pension offers

The Pensions Regulator, together with the FSA and HMRC is warning members to avoid offers that claim to be able to provide loans or release tax-free cash from members' pension pots before they reach age 55.

The Trustee urges members not to be taken in by website promotions, cold-calls or adverts encouraging members to transfer their existing pensions to a new arrangement to access a cash payment or loan. A valuable source of information

In October, the Government website Directgov was replaced by its successor, www.gov.uk. The design has been updated in an effort to make the site more user-friendly, with topics being broken down into sections.

The site holds a wealth of information on areas such as transport, education, the law, your rights, benefits, housing, and disability. The benefits adviser tool has also been included, so that you can check your entitlement to benefits. By entering

your answers to relevant questions, the tool can provide you with an idea of any benefit you may be entitled to, as well as providing a rough estimate of the amount if you are eligible. All information is strictly confidential, is not stored and you do not need to provide address or other identifying information apart from your first name. If the adviser tool suggests that you may be eligible for benefit, you will be given information on how to make a claim (this will not be done automatically for you). To use the benefits adviser, visit www.gov.uk and click on the heading 'Benefits'.

Free TV licences for over-75s

TV Licensing is reminding anyone due to turn 75 within the next year that they will be entitled to a free TV Licence on their 75th birthday. Eligible people can register online at www.tvlicensing.co.uk/over75 or by calling 0300 790 6073. The free licence will cover all the equipment in a property, meaning family or carers living in the same home could also benefit. Importantly, anyone currently aged 74 or over can begin planning for the concession immediately by applying for a short-term licence that will last between one and 11 months.

THE 1969 FIRST XI CRICKET TEAM

It is always so very nice to hear from pensioners far afield and below is an email I received from Vaju Pattni, who now lives in Southern California.

I thank you so much for a copy of the Pension News. It has brought back a lot of memories of the eleven years of my association with the Head Office at High Holborn.

I left in 1980 and moved to Southern California, USA but the thought of my days at Pearl and the people I worked with has not left me yet and will never leave me. It was the most wonderful eleven years I had. Many times I wonder as to who I will meet, if I visit, that worked with me and remember the old days. I did visit once and 252 High Holborn had changed and Pearl was not around. It was such a good feeling to be outside on the street and looking at the building. I started on the 7th floor and then was on the 1st floor in the Secretary's Department, where I spent many years.

The vivid memory I have is the picture I have attached here of the 1st eleven Cricket team at that time.

Vaju asked if I could put him in touch with any of those in the photograph and I believe contact has now been made with Derek Underwood, who says: "this picture could have been taken to mark the fact that 1969 saw the emergence, for the first time, of a squad of 15 players all of whom could perform adequately to 1st team level. Missing from the photograph were regular players Ron Lambe, Len Dowse, Ron Froude and Malcolm Bennett. The two last named would have been automatic choices for any "best post-World War 2 Pearl XI, together with Doug Proctor (a prolific spinning batsman) and Gordon Burroughs (the most successful Pearl bowler of all time) and Eric Haynes, who

was clearly the best cricketer the Pearl ever produced. During WW2 Eric played in an Army side, several of whom were England Test players, including Len Hutton and Hedley Verity."

I do have a copy of the publication, containing many pictures and statistics, entitled 'A century of Pearl cricket (1883-1993)' which was compiled by Norman Gray with contributions from Derek Underwood and Douglas Eldridge and designed and edited by John Bishop. 

Olympic dream

When the announcement came that London had won the vote to hold the Olympic games of 2012, a huge cheer went up in my home, especially since Stratford is about three miles from where my late wife and I were brought up. We had seen the proposed site become a wasteland after all the industry in that area was displaced.

I was brought up on the Isle of Dogs, quite close to where Canary Wharf is today. Nearby, a park with a wonderful view of Greenwich, the old Naval college, the National Maritime museum just behind and then the park with the hill leading to the clearly visible old Royal Observatory, it is said to be the only view of London that Canaletto would recognise and was painted pretty much from where the Poplar Blackwall and District rowing clubhouse is today. Through a pedestrian tunnel under the Thames, all the sites of Greenwich could

be reached. My childhood friends and I spent many hours exploring. Armed with a sandwich, a bag of crisps and a bottle of Tizer, we would roam and play without disturbing anybody all day.

Adulthood saw me serving an apprenticeship with a company of electrical engineers and contractors. The area that would become the Olympic Park was typical of the variety of places of work. Sporting life took me to Eton Manor, which forms part of the Olympic Park too. I would eventually belong to a similar organisation and Eton Manor would be one of our main opponents at rugby, soccer, cricket and so much more.

Visiting the resting places of my late wife's family at the catholic cemetery in Leytonstone and then onto those of my family means using the Docklands light



railway about four times a year, when I would watch the stadium and surrounding area develop. I was determined to go to the games. As soon as ticketing arrangements were announced I registered and entered competitions and draws, all to no avail. I gave up hope of achieving what had been my lifelong dream.

Life as a child in London meant playing all sorts of games in the street, football, cricket, rounders and more. Then one day for no obvious reason, all the boys suddenly started

running round the streets; I now know it was because of the 1948 Olympics in London. The street was marked out using a tape measure, and many races took place; it was such fun and continued until I went to work – it may still do so today. Many of the games tickets went to corporate organisations, many were not used and the organisers decided to resell those tickets. I tried to purchase some, without luck, then at 3am on the first Monday I awoke to find my laptop still on and tickets available. At 9am I was in John Lewis buying a Team GB shirt. Leaving home at 1pm to make my way down to Stratford I decided to give the Javelin train a try, wonderful, just 6 minutes from St. Pancras and 2 1/2 hours from Peterborough door to door. The athletics started, and there was entertainment appearing on the screens around the stadium, including an interview with comedian Hugh Dennis. His father John had been the vicar on the Isle of Dogs at the beginning of the sixties, (I knew Hugh as a little boy), and he mentioned his time there. Unfortunately I didn't see any British

victories but did witness Usain Bolt receive his 100 metre medal and Isinbayeva, a long time heroine of mine, compete in the women's pole vault, before dancing round the arena with delight at her medal. Who says a bronze isn't worth having?

Now hooked on trying for more tickets, the opening ceremony of the Paralympics presented an opportunity. On arrival at the stadium I was given an apple and told to wait until instructed before eating it.

What an experience, seeing all the athletes enter the stadium, the raising of the flag and lighting of the cauldron. An illuminated plane started proceedings, flying around the

stadium. At the given command everyone had to bite into the apple - and along with 79,999 other people I became a world record holder for crunching an apple at the same time.

Further hooked, I managed to purchase a ticket for the closing ceremony, another great occasion.

For the cost of the three visits I could have had a few weeks in the Canary Islands in a five star hotel on full board, so was it worth it? Most definitely, I would say, and an ambition was achieved.

The Bereavement Service

A simple service

Last year, the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) launched the Bereavement Service, with the aim of simplifying the system for individuals to report a death.

The service is part of the 'Tell Us Once' programme, which was established to allow customers to notify several local and central government departments of a change in circumstances through one point of contact, rather than having to make several calls and provide repeat information. As well as reporting a death through the Bereavement Service, Tell Us Once can be used to report a birth or even a change in address, and this information is then passed on to all relevant departments on behalf of the individual.

Most local authorities operate the Bereavement Service, and once the death has been registered, the registrar will explain how the service can be used. The options for contacting the service are:

- In person (by appointment)
- On the telephone
- Online

Please note that in order to use the service fully, certain information must be supplied in order to allow the deceased to be correctly identified and for their details to be updated by each organisation/department notified of their death. The following will be requested:

- National Insurance number and date of birth of the deceased
- Their passport or passport number and their town/county of birth
- Driving licence or driving licence number
- Blue Badge (if applicable)
- Death certificate
- Details of any State benefits the deceased received.

The Bereavement Service may be offered at the same time as the death is registered, or you may choose to use the telephone or online service if you prefer. To use the

telephone or online service, you will need a unique reference code, which will be issued by the registrar - without registering the death and receiving this code, you will be unable to use the service.

Benefit check

If you are the next of kin to the deceased person, you may become entitled to some State benefit due to your change in circumstances. The Bereavement Service can also help you to check your entitlement, again saving extra phone calls and time.

For more information on Tell Us Once, contact your local authority. You can find their details in your area phone directory, or visit the new government website www.gov.uk, where you can enter your postcode to find contact details.
